# MILTON ABBAS PARISH NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN IMPORTANT VIEWS ASSESSMENT 2019

# Introduction

- 1. This purpose of this document is to support the policies in the Milton Abbas Neighbourhood Plan that seek to conserve important, distinctive views and vistas within the Parish. It briefly sets out the methodology used to identify the proposed important views and vistas. A short explanation with supporting photographic evidence has also been provided.
- 2. The Milton Abbas Parish boundary is set within the Dorset Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and encompasses a Conservation Area which includes much of Milton Abbas village, the Abbey and school buildings, St Catherine's Chapel and the lake; and an area enclosing the Abbey, school buildings, lake and Capability Brown landscape which is designated as a Historic Park. The surrounding countryside is described as follows in the North Dorset Landscape Character Assessment:

"The Plan area sits almost entirely within the Dorset Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) with the exception of the southernmost part around Bagber and Hewish Farms. It lies in the Dorset Downs and Cranborne Chase National Character Area and is described as a chalk valley and downland landscape associated with Upper Milborne and Upper North Winterborne Valleys. Key characteristics of these locally defined landscape character areas include:

- Heart shaped valley enclosed with dry tributary valleys and deep coombes associated with the Upper Winterborne Valley, and a more linear and intimate 'V' shaped chalk valley with associated winterbourne and surrounding steep branching valleys and open chalk downlands in the Upper Milborne Valley to the west
- Thin calcareous soils with underlying geology of chalk
- Incised valley slopes with patches of semi-natural chalk grassland and broadleaved woodlands
- Clear chalk winterbourne stream with floodplain supporting occasional water meadows, wet woodlands, water cress beds and rough damp meadows
- Winding rural lanes along the valley floor with a series of small linear and nucleated villages of brick, flint, stone, thatch and cob
- Smaller scale pastures and fields patterns on valley floor with species rich dense hedgerows, small broadleaved woodlands and occasional hedgerow trees

- Designed parkland landscapes with veteran trees, railings, flint walls and country houses along the valley floor
- Secluded, intimate and tranquil character

These landscapes have a strong character. Occasional unsympathetic leylandii and conifer planting, signage along the rural lanes and urban fringe land use and horse pastures around settlements are noted as issues that are detrimental to this character."

- 3. The character of this parish is defined by the rolling Dorset countryside and farmland, and by the nationally important architectural heritage of Milton Abbey with Capability Brown's landscape surrounding it, and the original 18<sup>th</sup> century 'Model Village' of Milton Abbas.
- 4. This assessment focusses on areas of potential development around the village, and highlights the many panoramic views of the surrounding Dorset countryside and distant hills. There is a significant number of views across the countryside, all within the Dorset Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, and it would be impossible to list all of them. However, some are included to show Milton Abbas in its countryside setting which is an integral part of its character and amenity. Also included are views of Milton Abbey and the 18<sup>th</sup> century 'Model Village' which are central to the character of the village and are established visitor attractions.

# Methodology

# 5. Identifying sites

A number of important views have been suggested by the steering group for inclusion in the plan, and the most significant ones are set out below and five additional views have been included following public consultation.

## 6. Site visits

Members of the Steering Group undertook field surveys to assess and photograph the views put forward.

7. Criteria used for defining an Important Public View

The Steering Group ensured that the views were public rather than private views and visible either from the public highway, public footpaths, bridleways, public open spaces or space to which the public has unfettered access. They were carefully recorded, mapped and assessed.

#### 8. The reasons

The reason for the importance of each view is established by assessing its role in relation to the character of the parish and local heritage as follows:


- a) Important to the character and/or setting of the Conservation Area
- b) Important to the setting of a listed building(s)
- c) Important landscape views
- d) Important to the settlement setting and/or approach
- e) Important view of landmark feature such as a listed building; woodland; settlement





Public access: Views 5 and 6 are accessed from a route which is currently signposted as a permissive footpath (View 6 also being seen from the permissive path off this track that links to Jane's Wood, which the Parish Council also has right of access over). The track linking from Catherines Well to Hilton Road is subject to an application (made September 2009) to be included on the definite rights of way map as a Restricted Byway. This application was considered by the Dorset County Council Regulatory Committee on 12 July 2018 – full papers can be seen here:

The committee RESOLVED (unanimously) that:

(a) An order be made to modify the definitive map and statement of rights of way to record the route from Catherine's Well to Hilton Road as shown A1-A3-B-B1-C-D on Drawing 14/21/2 as a restricted byway; and (b) If the order is unopposed, or if any objections are withdrawn, it be confirmed by the County Council without further reference to the Committee.

At the current time it is understood that the order has been appealed, and therefore the final decision is awaited.


